This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable improvements** to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

**The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated [Primary PE and sport premium guidance](#).**

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	96%	Children swim in Year 3 and in Year 4. Any child who can't swim 25m confidently continues to swim in Years 5 and 6 until they can do so.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	96%	Children practice swimming a range of strokes during their swimming lessons.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	96%	Self-rescue includes getting out of the swimming pool without using the steps, floating and treading water.

- to utilise 100% of allocation (£17,360 expected)
- Lunchtime sports clubs £3,300 (lunchtime sport delivered every week)
- Corsham Cluster sports network contribution £1,000
- Corsham Cluster sports staff cover £810 (9 afternoons of supply cover based on £90 rate)
